Author –	Unknown. Maybe Job? Christian tradition holds that Job wrote it, but there is no clear Jewish tradition.	
Date –	Unknown. Probably the same time as Abraham or Isaac or Jacob.	
	Job is the oldest book in the Bible. The Hebrew that is used is really ancient and is really difficult to translate.	
	The Exodus was around 1446 BC, so that was the earliest that Genesis was written. Job is at least 800 years older (before 2100 BC).


Job 1:1-5	
Note: Blameless is not sinless. Blameless means he never got a speeding ticket, never stole a candy bar, never cursed or did anything that anyone might accuse him of.	
God seems to have justified Job's life so to question Job's integrity is to question God.	
"Much later in the book we will catch a glimpse of what Job actually did with his money, and with his time and energy: he rescued the needy; he cared personally for the handicapped and the dying; he brought orphans into his home; he even took the power barons of his day to court and argued the case for the underprivileged (see 29:12-17; 31:16-21)." — "The Gospel According to Job" Mike Mason	
Job 1:6-12	
Sons of God had to present themselves, including The Satan (the adversary), and they have to give an account of what they've been doing.	
1 Peter 5:8 - Be sober, be vigilant; because your adversary the devil walks about like a roaring lion, seeking whom he may devour.	
1:8 Then the Lord said to Satan, "Have you considered My servant Job, that there is none like him on the earth, a blameless and upright man, one who fears God and shuns evil?"	
Considered – literally "set - your heart - over." God set Adam in the the garden (Genesis 2:8). Every intent of the thoughts of his heart were evil continually (Genesis 6:5). The Spirit of God moved over the face of the waters (Genesis 1:2).	
If you're going to overthrow a fortified position, you reconnoiter, you examine the blueprints, you watch who comes and goes, you set your entire concentration on that target.	
1:9 Does Job fear God for nothing? Have You not made a hedge around him?	

 Job 1:13-22
 Oxen and donkeys were stolen and the servants killed – Job's business is destroyed.
 Sheep and servants consumed by fire from heaven – Job's bank account is destroyed.
 Camels are taken and servants killed – Job's personal possessions are destroyed.
• Sons and daughters are killed – Job's family is destroyed. that you may be able to withstand in the evil day, and having done all, to stand
- Ephesians 6:13
 Job made his stand against fear and did not give in to panic.
 Job made his stand against make-believe pretending and appropriately mourned.
 Job made his stand against pride and humbled himself before God.
 Job made his stand against self and decided to worship God.
 Job made his stand against a time-bound mindset and chose to think in terms of eternity.
 Job made his stand against unbelief and did not give in to vain questionings of God.
• Job made his stand against despair and saw the hand of God, even in catastrophe.
 Job made his stand against anger and did not blame God.
 Job 2:1-6
 Skin is the largest organ on your body.
 God sets a limit on the Satan: you can touch Job but do not take his life.
Job 2:7-10
 His symptoms: Intense pain (30:17). Peeling and darkened skin (30:30). Painful itching pus-filled, erupting sores (2:7, 2:8, 7:5). Anorexia, emaciation (19:20). Fever (30:30). Depression (7:16, 30:27-28). Weeping (16:16). Sleeplessness (7:4), Nightmares (7:14). Putrid breath (19:17), Difficulty breathing (9:18).
 • This condition lasted for months (7:3, 29:2).

Job 2:11-13
Job's friends sit there for 7 days, which was a usual time of grief.
They are to be admired because they came to Job.
 They are to be admired because they wept for and with Job.
They are to be admired because they sat in silence with Job for seven days.
• They are to be admired because they intended all the best for Job and were persistent in wanting and doing what they thought was best for Job.
They are to be admired because they spoke their opinion about Job and his condition to Job himself, instead of speaking about him to others.
As men, we want to figure things out. Why did this happen? How can I fix it?
Job is going to start working through all this and what follows is 32 chapters of men trying to figure things out.
Chapter 3 Job talks a lot about darkness and creation and he wishes to have never been born. He speaks about the grave as if those who are dead are at rest. Job's view of death is very interesting and we'll see how he's probably moved by emotion.
He's in a deep emotional state, yet he never considers suicide.
3:25 - For the thing I greatly feared has come upon me, And what I dreaded has happened to me.
Literally "The fear (my fear) that I feared-feared, is come upon me, and that fear I was afraid of has come upon me."
This paints a picture that Job is terrified of God. He won't even use a negative word like "curse" next to a reference to God.
1:5 – it maybe be that my sons have sinned and [blessed] God in their hearts
1:11 – touch all that he has, and he will surely [bless] You to Your face 2:5 – touch his bone and flesh and he will surely [bless] You to Your face 2:9 – [Bless] God and die
How about our lives? Do we have a fear of God that He's always watching in case we sin so He can smite us?
Is this a bar room bet between God and the Satan? Remember the Tapestry of scripture. God is going to use the Satan to do something unexpected.
